
Knee Deep Into History Battlefield Tours

Third Reich Undergroud—Rockets, Aircraft and More! Small Group Battlefield Tour 10 – 15 October 2025 (6-days / 5-nights)



Get knee deep into history where the desperate German war industry went underground to avoid Allied bombardment, burying its factories and assets in disused mines or newly-built tunnel systems, hundreds of which were under construction all over the *Reich* by the war's end.

This six-day tour will visit the underground installations in central Germany, along with associated forced labor sites. Participants will visit the rapidly-expanded *Mittelbau-Dora* concentration camp, where the Nazis assembled the V-2 rockets and V-1 flying bombs, as well as the secret *REIMAHG* factory complex for the assembly of the Me-262 jet fighters, and an exclusive visit to the underground factory which made the jet engines for these aircraft. Additional sites will focus on the tens of thousands of slave laborers who were forced to work on these construction projects, including a visit to *Ohrdruf*, the first concentration camp liberated by US troops and an underground jet fuel refinery, where Jewish-American POWs were forced to evacuate over a dozen tunnels.

We'll also visit one of Germany's vast salt mines, including a visit to the room where Patton's army famously discovered the *Reichsbank's* gold reserves.


Join us for this very unique above- and underground tour that showcases the lengths the Nazis went to in order to continue war-time armament production and the horrific cost in human life that resulted.

Schedule: (Subject to Modification)

Pick-up and return point for this tour will be Frankfurt Airport (FRA). A specific meeting point will be provided later. Participants are responsible for arranging their own transportation to and from the meeting point. Participants with their own vehicles can arrange to meet us at an alternate location.

Day 1, Friday, 10 October: Pick-up at FRA at 12:00pm. Drive to hotel. Time for resting and/or sight-seeing in Weimar before dinner. Briefing at hotel followed by a welcome dinner. Overnight in Weimar, Germany.

Day 2, Saturday, 11 October: Morning visit to the Museum Zwangsarbeit (forced labor) im Nationalsozialismus in Weimar, Germany. Afternoon visit to the Berga Concentration Camp / Schwalbe V facility, where Jewish-American POWs were forced to build an underground jet fuel refinery. Dinner and overnight in Weimar, Germany.

Day 3, Sunday, 12 October: Mittelbau-Dora Concentration Camp walking tour, including the underground V-1 and V2 factory. Visit to the Heimkehle, a Junkers aircraft factory in a natural cave, and Ellrich (aka Mittelbau II), the largest Dora sub-camp. Overnight in Kahla, Germany.

Day 4, Monday, 13 October: REIMAHG sites (secret Me-252 jet fighter factory) starting at the Museum in Kahla and continuing up the Walpersberg mountain. This will be the most physically-demanding walking day of the tour, including walking up the Walpersberg to the former Me-262 runway. Overnight in Kahla, Germany.

Day 5, Tuesday, 14 October: Kamsdorf, the secret underground jet engine factory for Me-262s in an abandoned iron mine. This will be an exclusive underground tour to parts of the factory not normally open to the public, guided with flashlights and helmets. This will be a physical day, spending several hours underground. Cultural break: After the Kamsdorf tour we will visit the 13th century Leuchtenburg Castle, which overlooks the Thuringian landscape. Overnight in Kahla, Germany.

Day 6, Wednesday, 15 October: Commemoration ceremony at Ohrdruf, the first camp liberated by U.S. troops, and the Jonastal Valley, where inmates worked on a secret bunker. Afternoon tour of Merker's salt mine, where the Reichsbank gold reserves were discovered, as portrayed in *The Monuments Men*. Afternoon drive back to FRA. We anticipate arriving at FRA around 7:00pm.

Participants are responsible for arranging their own accommodations before flying back to the U.S. in the morning and/or further travel plans departing that evening.

Knee Deep Into History's Tour Philosophy

Knee Deep Into History, LLC was founded by Randy Gaulke in 2020 after he spent eight months in 2017-18 as a freelance guide to the American battlefields of WW1. During those eight months (and the prior thirty years) Randy's tour philosophy has evolved. We:

- 1. TAKE clients into the field,
- 2. GUIDE small-group tours (12 max.),
- 3. PROMOTE a balanced view of both sides,
- 4. OFFER tours for passionate history buffs,
- 5. BRIDGE cultures.

What to Expect from a KDIH Tour

- Our small-group tours are designed to enable maximum interaction between participants and guides. Size is generally limited to a maximum of 12 participants.
- Clients will be picked up and returned to the designated starting and ending point at the times indicated.
 - Clients desiring other arrangements need to communicate their needs to Randy Gaulke in advance with the understanding that KDIH has to balance an individual client's needs with the group.
- On tour days, participants should expect to be "in the field" from 09h00 to somewhere around 17h00, regardless of weather. This will be followed by a break and dinner around 19h30.
 - o Participants should bring appropriate clothing for the field, and nicer clothing for evening meals.
 - o Please see the clothing guide on our website for ideas.
- Spouses and mature young adults are welcome, but please understand that there will be limited down time for sightseeing and time off.
 - When moving from one hotel to another, it will generally not be possible to stay in town.
- Regarding meals:
 - o Continental breakfast will be served at the hotel.
 - o Sandwich lunches (with wonderful European bread) will be eaten "in the field" to conserve time.
 - o Snacks of water, soda, fruit and sweets will be available for free in the van to recharge one's batteries.
 - o Multi-course dinners will generally start at the hotel/restaurant around 19h00.
 - Traditional European dinners often last two hours +/-.
 - This gives participants a chance to socialize, ask questions of the guides and share their experiences of the day.
- As per the 2025 Terms and Conditions, in the event that we have fewer than six participants signed up 61 days prior to the tour, we reserve the right to cancel the tour or we can run the tour with only one guide and/or step the hotels down to high-quality two-star hotels.

Meet Tour Guides Graham Gaulke, Patrick Brion and Randy Gaulke



Graham Gaulke's passion for exploring the Third Reich's underground manufacturing sites began a decade ago, when he explored an underground aircraft factory in Waltenheim, France. Since then, Graham has visited and documented dozens of aboveground and underground sites; and he has combined these visits with archival research in Washington, D.C. and Europe. As a result, Graham has developed a thorough understanding of the Third Reich's efforts to move its arms production underground and it inextricable relationship that this has had with forced labor. Graham has attended several concentration camp commemorations and his photographs can be found on the information panels at several historical sites and on his website, https://graham-gaulke.format.com.

Patrick Brion is a retired Belgian Army officer living in Kahla, Germany. He has been actively researching and working to preserve some of these sites since the wall came down in 1989. Randy Gaulke has been studying military history for decades as a wargamer, reenactor and battlefield visitor. In 2017 he left the corporate world and during 2017-18 he lived and worked eight months in France as a freelance guide to the WW1 battlefields during the WW1 Centennial. His experiences during those eight months convinced him to follow his passion and start a tour business. Randy has also visited and guided tours of the WW2 battlefields since 2008. Over his life he has lived in Europe almost three years. He speaks fluent English and German and intermediate French. Randy lives in Winchester, VA, not far from the National Archives.
